Checklist: Designing a Poster Presentation

- □ The **title** succinctly describes the subject and conclusion of the poster
- The title is written in a large font size so that it is clearly visible to anyone passing by
- The authors and affiliations are spelled correctly and written in a smaller font size relative to the title
- The background/introduction provides just enough information for another scientist to understand your poster
- A clear scientific hypothesis/goal is highlighted in its own section or by using bold/italic text at the end of the background/introduction
- A methods section is only included if necessary, and briefly describes a unique approach that audience members will be unfamiliar with
- Each results section has a clear title that states the conclusion of the experiment
- A brief summary highlights 2-4 main findings and perhaps a statement on whether your hypothesis was supported or your goal achieved
- □ If including acknowledgements or references, use a font size smaller than the other sections of your poster and place them at the very bottom of the poster without any bounding boxes
- The amount of text is reduced as much as possible to make your poster more approachable and clear

- The sections of your poster have an intuitive layout so audiences know the correct order of information
- Borders are used to segregate individual sections of the poster
- The fonts you choose are easy to read and large enough to be seen at a distance
- Your text, figures, and individual poster sections are surrounded by empty space so your poster doesn't seem too crowded
- The background colors of your poster (and your poster's color scheme in general) don't distract from your content
- All visual elements are properly aligned so that you poster appears symmetrical and harmonious
- All extraneous items are eliminated, including institutional logos, poster numbers, and decorative graphics
- Your poster is completely intelligible on its own without your presence
- Your poster is completely free of errors, typos, and grammatical mistakes
